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### **Publication on COVID-19 and the role of parliament during a pandemic**

The global pandemic of the COVID-19 virus presents an unprecedented challenge, for which we must develop innovative techniques that ensure the fulfilment of our respective functions, while following the recommendations of the World Health Organization (WHO) on the prevention of the spread of this virus. As parliaments are the highest instance of democratic representation, legislators must continue to project the voice of citizens and keep them informed of the measures that are being adopted to protect public health.

For that reason, ParlAmericas has developed a publication on [COVID-19 and the role of parliament during a pandemic](#) in order to present an overview of the socioeconomic and public health implications of this pandemic; mitigation and adaptation recommendations in order to continue performing parliamentary work; and a reflection on the important role of parliamentarians during a health crisis, bearing in mind the role of political control over the actions being taken in our countries.


