Public Security in the Americas and the Caribbean: Parliamentary Responses to Organized Crime and Violence

October 21, 22, and 23, 2026 | Valparaíso, Chile

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The second gathering of the ParlAmericas Parliamentary Network on Security will be held in a hemispheric context in which public insecurity has become one of the primary challenges affecting people's daily lives, the wellbeing of communities, and opportunities for social and economic progress.

The expansion of illicit economies, the sophistication of criminal networks, lethal violence, extortion, and other manifestations of insecurity are placing growing pressure on States, justice systems, and democratic governance. The Gathering will offer a space for parliamentarians from the Americas and the Caribbean to examine regional trends, share national experiences and good practices, and reflect on the role of parliamentary action to strengthen effective public security policies that align with the rule of law and human rights and contribute to the safety of people and communities.

17:15 - 18:30 **Session 2 – Illicit Economies: The Financing of Criminal Networks and the Circulation of Illicit Funds**

This session will explore the main illicit economies that finance organized crime in the region, including drug trafficking, human trafficking, arms trafficking, extortion, illegal mining, and cybercrime. It will also explore how these resources infiltrate the formal economy and influence public institutions, territories, and social dynamics. The discussion will address phenomena such as money laundering, corruption, and the use of cryptocurrencies, as well as their effects on economic dependence, market distortions, institutional weakening, and democratic governance.

10:15 - 11:45	Session 3 – Public Insecurity and Daily Life: Impacts on People and Communities <i>This session will assess the human and community dimensions of public insecurity, analyzing how its various manifestations affect the daily lives, rights, and wellbeing of individuals and communities. It will explore issues such as homicide, extortion, the recruitment of children and youth by criminal networks, and the differentiated impacts of insecurity on women, girls, and other historically marginalized groups. 12:00 - 13:30	Session 4 – Public Security Under Pressure: Effectiveness and Human Rights <i>This session will examine responses to public insecurity through an approach centred on the protection of people and communities, the rule of law, human rights, and States' international obligations. The discussion will explore strategies to ensure that the exercise of State powers – particularly in contexts of intense pressure to deliver immediate results – remains consistent with the principles of legality, proportionality, effectiveness, the protection of rights, and accountability. 15:00 - 17:30 **Session 5 – Panel and Working Groups - Public Security and Justice: Institutional Capacities to Address Crime**

This session will explore how strengthening and modernizing justice systems can improve responses to crime, reduce impunity, and consolidate more effective and legitimate public security policies. Beginning with an introductory presentation, it will provide an overview of the institutional capacities, conditions, and reforms needed for justice systems to respond more effectively to the different manifestations of insecurity, in accordance with human rights and States' international obligations.

Parliamentarians will then engage in working group discussions to exchange national experiences, good practices, and lessons learned on specific dimensions of the justice system related to public security.
